Our online resources continue to grow with the help and support of the Canada Summer Jobs Grant. In 2022 this enabled us to hire a student who was able to update and add resources to both our P.E.A.C.E. Resources and P.E.A.C.E. Humane websites.

Also in 2022, we upgraded our web hosting to help with the user experience and increase page load speed time. Volunteers were able to, through a new online system, split up the program's webpages to be separate stand-alone websites, but still make it look unified. The main difference is that the program's name is before the main peacecanada.org webpage url. For example: resources.peacecanada.org and rescue.peacecanada.org.

P.E.A.C.E. Rescue started in 2019 with the mission to help farm sanctuaries and farmed animals, as we saw a need for an organization dedicated to helping with rescue, transport, and medical costs of farmed animals.

In 2022 we continued to help farmed animals and farm sanctuaries through rescue. Due to the move to our new property at the start of 2022, and all the work associated with it, the charity for 2022 scaled back to mainly concentrate on BC rescue support while establishing the P.E.A.C.E. Rescue property and barn.

Most farm sanctuaries are full if not overfull. As such, having space to keep newly rescued individuals separate and in quarantine from the regular sanctuary residents is usually very difficult and uncommon practice in Canadian farm sanctuaries.

We have learned in the last 4 years of operation as a rescue, working with groups in Canada and USA, how essential quarantine is as a practice, especially when it comes to the safety of individuals already in a sanctuary's care when it comes to disease control. That is why we made it a priority to establish in 2022.



At P.E.A.C.E. Humane we promote compassion for all through humane education. We are committed to offering innovative and ethical alternatives that keep animals out of the classroom, as well as providing a variety of resources that teach empathy and respect for animals (human and non-human) and the environment.

Our online compassionate resources continue to grow, as noted in our P.E.A.C.E. Resources section, with the ongoing support of the Canada Summer Jobs grant, which helped us hire a student during the summer in 2022.

The Chick It Out app, which is a humane and ethical alternative to live egg hatching, was completed this year. We are so grateful to Catherine Lamarche, a teacher on Vancouver Island, who helped us with the French and Spanish translations to make the app more accessible.

Also in 2022, our Executive Director was invited to talk about the ethical dilemma with egg hatching projects and promote the Chick It Out app, doing a presentation called "Cracking The Ethics: Egg Hatching Projects" at the Educators for Animals Conference.

P.E.A.C.E. Farm Sanctuary is a microsanctuary located in Mission, BC, focusing on animal-centered design. We are not a petting zoo, but true to the word, sanctuary: A safe space for rescued individuals.

At the new property, we established a rooster microsanctuary in 2022. Through our P.E.A.C.E. Rescue program, roosters are some of the individuals we get the most requests for.

We also wanted to follow our own advice of "starting small", helping to promote microsanctuaries as an accessible concept, as well as break the stigma with regards to keeping roosters together in a group.

In 2022 we were able to give Brent, Josh, Raju, John, and Henry a home.

The Billy Fund was created in memory of a very special individual who was rescued early 2019 by P.E.A.C.E. They had a larger than life personality but sadly the cards were stacked against them with being born with wry neck and other disabilities. Though they had a short life, they've made an everlasting impact, and in honour of their memory, The Billy Fund was created to help other rescues like themselves who have disabilities.

The Billy Fund supports animals with unique medical needs, or disabilities. Funded items include mobility devices, medical bills and therapeutic procedures.

In 2022 we received wonderful support for this fund from a local business, and were able to help Pirate from A Home For Hooves Farm Sanctuary with medical support getting a new prosthetic.





This morning went well for Pirate and he's currently waking up from sedation.

Once our team was ready Pirate walked into the chute immediately when enticed with some apples. We then immobilized him further with sorting boards so Dr. Watson could administer the sedatives. Pirate tolerated the very large needle quite well and we waited about 10 minutes for him to fall asleep. The first order of business was to trim the very knarly cloven hoof on his deformed leg, which took a significant amount of brute force to cut. Then Pirate's Orthotist Tim built a cast around Pirate's leg.

While we waited for the cast to set we trimmed Pirate's tusks and his remaining hooves. Then after Tim removed the cast, Dr. Watson debrided all the dead tissue from the hock of Pirate's leg and then he "reversed" one of the primary sedation drugs. We will be sitting with Pirate all day to monitor him for complications and ensure he recovers well. We will update everyone again this evening.

During todays events Pirate's Orthotist Tim provided us with a much appreciated lesson on proper terminology. "Prosthesis" is a device that provides a substitution for a body part that is missing and "orthosis" is a device that helps stabilize or support a deformity and assist with function. So Pirate is getting a new orthosis built, not a prosthesis:)

When Pirate arrived in our care last fall he had a third stage pressure sore on the hock of his deformed leg. After several attempts to try and fix the injury we made the decision to put him on bed rest to try and let the wound heal as much as possible. This has been a very long road to recovery and Pirate has been exceptionally patient and tolerant of the whole process.

I have so much love and appreciation for everyone who helped Pirate today and ensured this process went as smoothly as possible. I would also like to send a special thank you to PEACE Canada for covering the cost of Pirate's sedation through their "Billy Fund" which supports animals with unique medical needs or disabilities.









